

VHF SHIP STATION LICENSE? by Richard Hendry

These days anyone can use a VHF marine radio to communicate without requiring any special license, as long as they abide by certain rules. But this has not always been the case. In the 1960s, in order to use a VHF marine radio, you had to obtain a "ship station license" from the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), in the form of "Radio Telephone Third Class a Operator License . This license required one to go to a big city to take a test (for me - - San Francisco). Most people who took the FCC's test for a thirdclass license took a three-part test. The parts were called "elements." If you passed elements 1 and 2, you still had to pass element 3, the broadcast endorsement, and it was the hardest part. Lots of people passed elements 1 and 2 but flunked the 3rd, which meant that they had to take the whole thing again. The test touched on several subjects:Maritime: what are the standard distress frequencies used at sea; what is the meaning of the "Mayday" call; and what information should be included in a ship's position report? FCC Regulations: what are the basic rules regarding power output limitations for a third class radiotelephone operator; what are the restrictions on transmitting unnecessary

or offensive communications. When is a logbook required to be kept for communications? Procedure: How to properly call a station using radio procedures (phonetic alphabet, proper call signs); what is the correct format for a distress call: what are the standard radio frequencies for emergency communications; and how to handle routine radio traffic (relaying messages, and acknowledging. When passed, the official FCC certificate came in the mail a couple of weeks later. In those days, operators were required to post their licenses above the VHF radio from which they transmitted, so I had to frame mine, and I hang it proudly for display. On Jan. 5, 1979, the FCC eliminated the requirement to obtain a license to use a VHF marine radio

Springtime in Greece, the start of the 2015 season

There is snow in the mountains of the Peloponnesus. More snow on the peaks to the north across the Gulf of Corinth, the Parnassus range above Delphi. Patti Smith is belting out "Because the Night" in my ear phones. The highway is new but rough along the south coast of the gulf and I'm headed west to Preveza on a bus from Athens. This is a road we've traveled many times and the olive grove plains and vineyards vield to mountains within a few miles and to what was for 900 years the old Spartan stronghold. The Spartans sent back a one word reply, "If". Neither Phillip nor his peerless son Alexander the Great ever invaded Spartan territory.

It's a cool sunny morning and the gulf is deceptively calm. It can be really unpleasant beating to the west against the prevailing gulf winds in unsettled conditions. Best to hang out along the north shore, pick your times and/ or sail/motor westward in light air. There was a reason for galleys in the Med.

In few hours I'll see how things have gone at Cleopatra Marina over the winter. I hope to find the trusty steed reasonably clean and free from damage. Winter in Greece can still be winter. If the work I contracted to have done (installing a new water heater, not a simple job) is actually done and done well I'll be delighted. We're nearly to the rather magnificent Rio-Antirrio bridge at the west end of the gulf. Led Zeppelin's "All of My Love" playing, Robert Plant and Jimmy Page at their best. To the north towards Preveza the way is beautiful. Life is good!
